Makerere University Chancellor Prof. George Mondo Kagonyera has advised students to always have a positive and all-encompassing approach towards work in order to make the desired difference to society. He made these remarks while presiding over at the 65th graduation ceremony at Makerere University.

Prof. Kagonyera cautioned graduands to carefully utilize every opportunity and also avoid job discrimination between white and blue collar jobs. “You are graduating in various disciplines that you have chosen as the vehicles towards a better future. In the process, your families, your country and even the world, benefits from your knowledge. The world is expecting the best from you and with your skills

and proficiency, the name of Makerere University shall be hailed,” he said.

The Chancellor awarded a Doctor of Science (Honoris Causa) of Makerere University to Ms. Ruth Morris Keesling in recognition of her distinguished and selfless contribution to Makerere University, Uganda, East and central region of Africa and the world at large. Ms. Keesling was awarded due to her dedication towards the gorilla conservation legacy of the late Primatologist Dian Fossey; with a major contribution to the recovery of the Mountain Gorilla population from 248 at the time to the current estimate of 880.

Over 1972 students graduated from MUBS with 995 female students.

January 29, 2015, saw hundreds of people of all walks of life descend upon Katonga Hall, in Hotel Africana to witness yet another milestone in the life and time of an academic giant.

Chairman MUBS Council Prof. Venansius Baryamureeba launched his autobiography **"They will See Him"** in which he shares his life journey, childhood memories, family background and how all of this influenced him to become the man that he is today.

The title of the book is the direct translation of his name. This name embodies the dreams of his father, who upon birth named his son Baryamureeba; a Runyankore word meaning "They will See Him".

Decades have since passed and the child born in rural western Uganda has now risen up the ranks to become a force to reckon with in the academic circles of Uganda. His story is not only fascinating but also inspiring, especially as it uncovers the unvarnished and

uncomfortable truths about his life.

In his address at the launch, Prof. Venansius Baryamureeba said he drew the inspiration to write his own biography from Presidents, Nelson Mandela, Barack Obama and Ellen Johnson Sirleaf.

According to Dr Rose Namara a former classmate, as a child, Baryamureeba was reserved and always emerged among the best performing students in school.

In his address, Youth MP for Western Uganda Hon. Gerald Karuhunga described Prof. Baryamureeba as hardworking, focused and a nationalist, especially with regard to his tremendous deeds towards nation building in the field of Academics.

"So those are the values we cherish that can build our nation, therefore Professor this book is like a guide on how to devote our lives to serving the people of Uganda," he noted.

The Chief Executive Officer of NBS Television Mr. Kin Kariisa, congratulated Prof. Baryamureeba upon launching his autobiography and urged people to buy and promote the knowledgeable book.

Prof. Balunywa reasoned that the practice in government institutions is that if someone acts in a certain position for

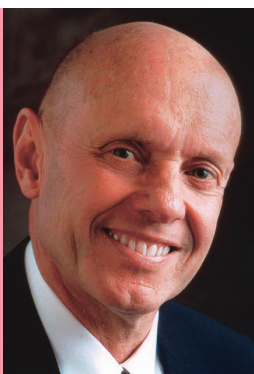
more than six months; they should be confirmed.

Management Theory, Research and Practice for Sustainable Development in Africa: A Commentary from a Practitioner's Perspective - Dr. Vincent Bagire & Dr. Juliana Namada

Abstract

In this article we give a synthesis of the argument that inadequate management theory and practice have contributed to Africa's lack of sustainable development. The article is based on a keynote address by the Governor of the Bank of Botswana, Ms Linah Mohohlo to the biannual conference of the Africa Academy of Management in Gaborone, January 2014. The governor, based on rich insights of a practitioner was content that scholars, practitioners, and policymakers have not done enough to integrate theory and practice to initiate

models relevant for African sustainable development. We therefore call upon African scholars, managers, and experts to take the challenge of identifying common cultural practices which could be integrated into modern management models for African sustainable development.

Management is central to Africa's sustainable development. However, it has had inadequate attention by both the scholars and practitioners. Management both in theory and practice has not featured prominently at high-level meetings of policymakers in the academia, political and economic arenas. Most of the models for Africa's development have not stated in clear terms how management practices influence resource allocation and utilization. A former president of Ghana used a non-scholarly definition that "management is the proper and astute administration of valuable resources for the express purpose of fulfilling personal, group, community, societal needs and aspirations in a sustainable way" (Lituchy, Punnett, & Puplampu, 2013, p.xvii). He emphasized a viewpoint that management is not only the presence of entrepreneurs or business executives but also all those who have responsibility over assets and resources. Governments have to combine democratic institutions and processes to yield a stable macro environment for investments to thrive. Scholars therefore need to take up the challenge and identify points of entry to place management at the centre of development models for Africa. The thrust of the address by the Governor, Bank of Botswana to the biannual conference of the Africa Academy of Management (AFAM) was to motivate a search for the kind of management theory, research and practice that can sustain Africa's development. The AFAM as a community of scholars must have management development as the starting point.

Applicants should be those in the SSH disciplines, who have completed their PhD studies or are at the advanced stage of their PhDs. Proposals revolving around the following broad themes are encouraged.

- Challenges facing African universities that the Diaspora could help overcome;
- Linkages existing between the Diaspora and African universities;
- Diaspora engagements with African universities;
- Policies and Incentive structures for mobilizing the African diaspora to support African higher education and research;
- Strengthening PhD programs in Higher Education, the SSH in African Humanities;
- Governance : Political, economic, environmental, social etc ;
- Current trends in economic theorization and African development;
- Higher education transformations and research trends in the SSH;
- Gender and African Development in the 21st century;
- Law and order regimes; including Africa's insertion into international law;

- Emerging issues in land use and distribution; including issues of Biotechnology, food production and hunger in Africa;
- Extraction industries and Africa's sustainability;
- Digital age and cultural reproduction in Africa;
- Political transitions and the fate of the state in Africa;
- SSH and emerging forms of Social Policy regimes in Africa;
- Emergent religious movements and forms of religious fundamentalism;
- The youth in African politics, economics and development discourse.

The joint research networks of African and African diaspora scholars should cover at least one of the following countries: Ghana, Nigeria, Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda and South Africa. Proposals with a strong multidisciplinary orientation and gender and institutional diversity in terms of the composition of group members are highly encouraged.

Interested academics and researchers of the African diaspora and those based in universities located in any of the countries listed above are requested to send in their research proposals, focusing on specific issues revolving around the broad themes identified above.

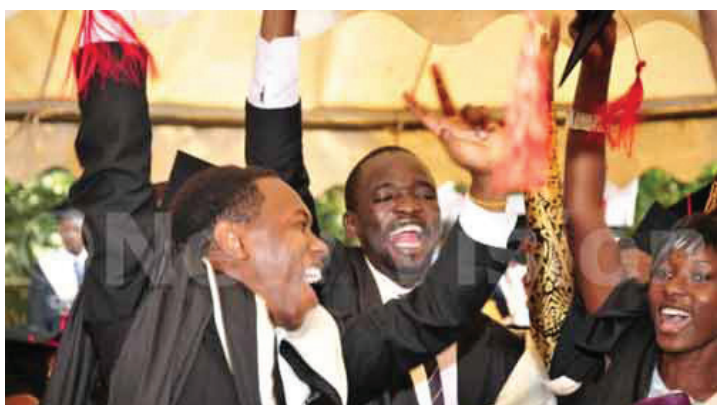

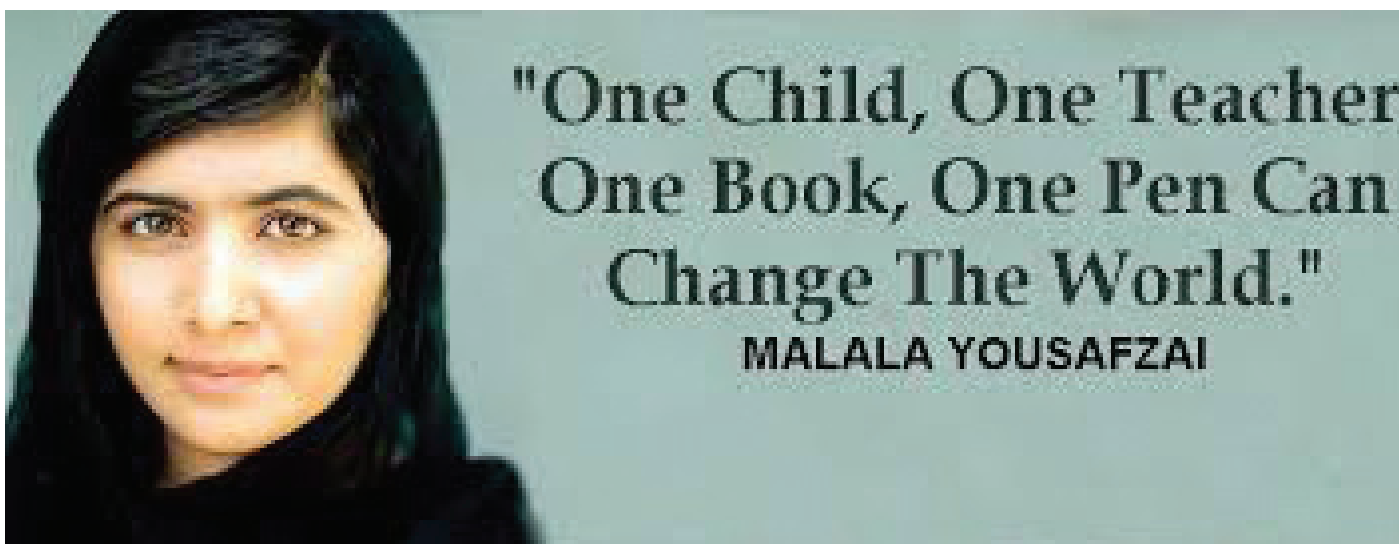

Makerere University Rules on examination malpractice and Irregularities

Rule 4:

Cheating in an Examination

It shall be an offence for any student/candidate involved in an examination to:

a) Take into the examination room/hall, in person or by agent, unauthorized materials including, but not limited to, plain papers, condensed/summarized notes, books, and handkerchiefs on which information is written or information written on any part of the body, recording apparatus, mobile phones or any unauthorized electronic equipment.

- Copy from any other candidate/student.

- Involve oneself in plagiarism, that is:

1. Pass off words or ideas of someone else as his/her own without proper acknowledgement or crediting

the original source.

2. Replicate one's own work which one has presented elsewhere for assessment.

3. Aid and/ or abet another candidate/student to copy from a script/ book of another person.

4. Exchange answers with another candidate/student in or outside the examination room.

b)(I) Collaborate with another candidate/student in the examination room to use telephone discussions and share material including calculators and other electronic equipment.

Further more, I thank and ask my fellow comrades who were in the race with me to keep close and advise accordingly so that we move on smoothly.

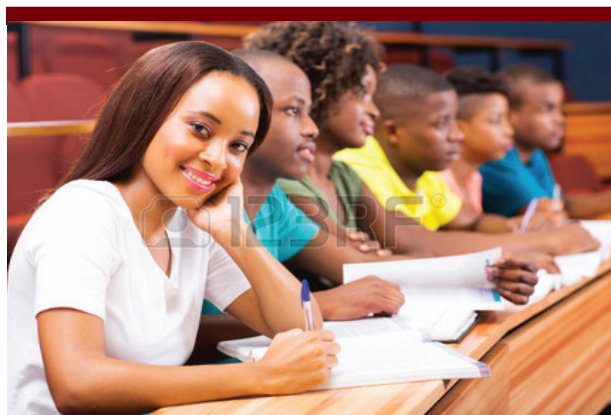
