total of one hundred and thirteen (113) Luzira inmates graduated at the 6th MUBS-Luzira graduation. The ceremony was held on Thursday July 23, 2018 at Luzira Maximum Security Upper Prison. The 113 who graduated had successfully completed their certificates and diplomas in Entrepreneurship and Small Business Management offered by MUBS. Out of the 113 graduates, fifty five, (55) obtained diplomas while fifty eight (58) graduated with certificates. The graduates were admitted for the 2015/2016 and 2016/2017 academic years. MUBS started the Luzira University Education programme in 2009 as a Corporate Social Responsibility which initiative has encouraged inmates at Primary and Secondary School levels to work harder to obtain higher education. The programme has also reduced the rate of recidivism.

Vice President urges academia on skills training

The African Business community has suffered perennial lack of adequate capital and entrepreneurial skills

he Vice President noted that the African Business community has suffered perennial lack of adequate capital and entrepreneurial skills and that the few who persisted in business have been consigned to small enterprises, most of whose lifespan has been short-lived.

He emphasized that there has been a major drawback to the development of African

countries which must change, to give a new direction to the continent. The business terrain should therefore focus on not only attracting more Foreign Direct Investors (FDIs), but also retaining them in order to develop the people and African countries.

He stressed that African countries have been looking for solutions on how best to link their people to the global community through business and trade, which would


return improve wellbeing. This was done through spearheading business activities, albeit with mixed success. This prompted African governments liberalize their economies by inviting the private sector to spearhead economic growth. Hon. Ssekandi noted that Uganda has realized significant growth transformation from a near informal economy in the

early 1980s to a more predictable economy which has been growing at an average of 5% per annum in terms of GDP, for a number of years. "These successes have nevertheless not been without setbacks, hence the need to come up with novel strategies that will put the country to another level of business performance and development," he said.

He emphasized that government has zeroed on changing the education system by focusing on skilling the youth through vocational education which is a centre piece of the new strategy. Government has been advocating and supporting the integration of vocational education in the school curriculum. This will equip the youth with requisite skills which they badly need as they enter the highly competitive job market. He said vocational education in Uganda will take care of the informal sector in providing jobs to the young people who constitute the majority of the country's population.

"In order to realize population dividend, the country will continue attracting foreign investors with the hope that they will instigate the growth of the country because they have expertise and capital to put up serious and sustainable businesses", Ssekandi emphasized. He also noted that government will redouble its efforts to ensure an enabling business environment, provision of infrastructure and enacting laws and regulations to support the growth of the private sector.

Hon. Ssekandi encouraged the creation of local business knowledge and entrepreneurship. "We are lucky to have a host of success stories for benchmarking. These include; the late James Mulwana, Gordon Wavamuno,

the Madhvanis, Mukwanos, and Karim Hirji among others. These should be engines to drive local business and entrepreneurship", he said. What Ugandans and indeed other African countries need is more of such local entrepreneurs with capacity to spearhead development in their own countries.

" I am glad to note that the academic fraternity has not sat on the fence, to simply roll out business theories from the safety of lecture theaters. As you appreciate, these theories may be completely different from realities of the business world. I wish therefore, to commend MUBS headed by Prof. Waswa Balunywa for spearheading this drive" he said.

Over the years, MUBS has created knowledge and shared it with local entrepreneurs and the greater business Through conferences world. like this one, MUBS has also caused cutting edge national and international debates on business and management in Uganda, Africa and the world. This is the reason **MUBS** conferences attract a big number of international participants. "I hope that together we shall share best business practices and experiences which will put our countries at another level of development", he noted.

The Vice President called upon the conference participants to deeply reflect on the theme "African Business Leaders; Creating the change Africa needs", to guide their subsequent debates, suggestions and recommendations to the policy makers.

Universities to work closely with political leaders to eradicate poverty in Africa. Evoking the words of Nelson Mandela "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world", he said that the secret of unlocking Africa's vast potential lies in educating the people.

Govt urged to involve academia in policy formulation

The immediate former Chancellor of Makerere University Prof. George Mondo Kagonyera, said that government should continuously consult with the academia on how to develop policies concerning the country. Prof. Kagonyera expressed regret that government at times failed to consult researchers and the academia in policy formulation yet the academia have developed a lot of knowledge through research which can be utilized by government.

He made the appeal during the MUBS 8th Annual International Leadership Conference held in July 2018. Prof. Kagonyera emphasized that good policies often fail because they are designed for political considerations instead of solving pressing socio-economic problems of the country

Africans cannot do Business: Prof. Balunywa

"Africans cannot do business, not just yet. It is foreign to them," said Prof. Waswa Balunywa at the opening of a three day Annual International Leadership Conference in Entebbe.

He explained that the concept of business emerged in the western world, following the industrial revolution. At the time, the West had to transform from the feudal society to one where the peasants had to work in factories to live. Around the same time in Europe, there was a period of renaissance, a period of enlightenment and education and training emerged as part of life. The socialization of the west was transformed from the feudal society to an industrialized society. Majority of the population in Africa, still live in rural areas and depend on subsistence farming. There is poverty every where and we have a big population that are suffering. Corruption is also another big problem in Africa.

Prof. Balunywa emphasized also that business is foreign to Africans. As long as there is a fall back position of family, friends and even political massaging, Africans cannot take business as a way of life. "We need a revolution that will transform African societies to prepare them for business. We need the insecurity that is created by the factory system where if you have no job, you will not live. It is only then that Africa will wake up and compete with the Asian and European communities in business. He explained that in many African countries, it is the Indians, Chinese or the Europeans that are managing businesses. They have been trained to know that without an economic activity there will be no future.

MUBS has graduated a total of 407 inmate students on both certificate and diploma in Entrepreneurship and Small Business Management since the introduction of the University Education programme at the Luzira Maximum Upper Prison in 2009.

The Deputy Principal Prof. Moses Muhwezi thanked the lecturers who teach the inmates for accepting to be inconvenienced by the Prisons rules and regulations. He also congratulated the inmates upon their achievements.

Inmate students perform better than those who are outside. Most of the inmates graduate with first class. I believe that you will also be first class citizens when you are released from prison", he said.

Meanwhile, the State Minister for Internal Affairs, Hon. Obiga Kania, who was the Guest of Honour, encouraged all inmates to enrol for the programme since being in cells does not mean it is the end of world for them. "The certificates you have earned today are tools for your lives here in prison and after. You may lose everything on this earth but the knowledge you have acquired will never be lost.

The Minister applauded MUBS and the Prisons authorities for training inmates, something he said was a step towards making society a better place. He said he is intending to lobby cabinet to ensure that degree programs are introduced for inmates.

Mobile Money Should not be taxed

peaking at the MUBS 8th Annual International Leadership Conference Entebbe, Dr. Fred Muhumuza, a renowned economist emphasized that, "Mobile money should not be taxed because Ugandans are already paying for services such as Water and Electricity bills through mobile money that are already subject to Value Added Tax (VAT) and other taxes. He said that several communications show that people transacting on mobile money were actually paying taxes because URA has put an avenue that one can pay their taxes using mobile money. He was making a presentation on the ideal macroeconomic conditions in Uganda for Business Leaders. also emphasized that the mobile money and social media taxes will not save government because it has huge debts to pay. On the continued depreciation of the shilling, Dr. Muhumuza said that little is produced in the economy and yet the consumption levels are high because Uganda imports more than its exports.

Dr. Muhumuza also cautioned government on the revival of Uganda Airlines saying that it shouldn't be an objective of government when there are other needs that can be financed with the money.

Government asked to prioritize girl child education

MUBS Principal, Prof. Waswa Balunywa noted that for government to effectively deal with unemployment and poverty, the education of the girl child must be prioritized so as to keep them in school and avoid teenage pregnancies. He noted that teenage girls who deliver babies are susceptible to perpetual poverty. Prof. Balunywa also emphasized

the need to concentrate on science to improve on technology and changing the negative attitudes that people have towards technical and vocational institutions and Entrepreneurship.

Ms. Prudence Ukkonika, is the proprietor of a winery firm, BELLA Wine. The Ugandan made wine derives its name from the acronym of the company's tag line: 'Belief leads to everlasting achievement.' Ukkonika started the wine business in 2000 as a small business selling affordable traditional wine. She was inspired by her departed son Godwin Ukkonika who left her with the vision for the potential of business after helping his uncle to produce wine in Kabale and sell it in Kampala. "It was not easy when I first started making wine, even registering the business was a problem. "We started this business from the sitting room, moved to a garage and we ended up renting a floor in Wandegeya before we set up our factory in Kira," Ukkonika narrates. I started with organic passion fruits which were making red wine yet people were asking me for white wine. I discovered I could make white wine from pineapples," she said.

She exports her wine to Italy, Germany and the consumption rate has increased remarkably.

is very important to have a vision and mission to guide you in business. It is also key to register the business so that you are not disturbed by the government, said Dr. Barbara Ofwono Buyondo, the Principal of Victorious Education Services. She noted that most people fear doing businesses because they fear failure, lack of a role model and collateral. Despite all the challenges, she encouraged the women with business ideas to get started. When I started business, I had only 30 children in the school but now there are 4,000 children in the four Campuses. People need to get out of their comfort zones and start. Sometimes, women think that men are better than them in running businesses. This is not true. All that women need is support from their husbands. She called upon business people to the attend MUBS Innovation hour for mentorship. "Work hard and have a supportive system if you are to succeed," she advised. "One thing you should know is that women are dependable. Four of my schools are managed by ladies. Men are good but ladies are outstanding".

Many businesses are started annually but majority do not go beyond five years. "I am in the business of creativity and dealing in leather. I am now making sandals, bags, shoes and other leather products and i buy the leather from Kenya", she shared.


Dr. Basalirwa hands over Leadership






